## Y Featured Educator

With the continued hope that no news is good news, our monthly newsletter has added an occasional feature article. In this issue, we highlight the career of Huntington educator, **Jack Abrams** (1930-2020).

Jack was a ' 48 graduate of Andrew Jackson High School, served in the U.S. Army Signal Corps in Korea, graduated from New Paltz with an Education major, and received advanced degrees from Hofstra and Columbia.

His 57-year career in Huntington began as a sixth grade teacher at Woodbury Avenue Elementary School (sadly demolished in 1987), where he filled his classroom with fascinating artifacts and excited his students with lively scientific topics. He then served as the district's Elementary Schools Science Co-ordinator, as well as the principal at Nathan Hale, Woodbury, Washington, Village Green, Woodhull, and Jefferson Elementary Schools, as well as Toaz/Finley's Sixth Grade School, where he introduced sixth graders to the program at Camp Greenkill in Huguenot for four days & three nights of hands-on outdoor educational activities. Loving time spent in the classroom, he spent a year teaching fifth grade at Sidcup, Bexley, in London, through the Fulbright Teacher Exchange Program - as well as another year as a third grade teacher in Northport while on sabbatical.

In his 1987 retirement, he founded and curated the Huntington Schools Heritage Museum, which houses over 1,500 historic artifacts from its union free schools. After 25 years in that position, Mr. Abrams retired again in 2012, and he and his wife, Eileen, divided their time between East Northport and Florida, until her death in the following year.



In 2008, the Huntington School Board voted to rename Huntington Intermediate School in honor of Jack Abrams. The formal dedication attracted several hundred students, colleagues, and family members.

His two daughters, Kathi Abrams and Jodi Donoher, his extended family of Anthony, Nicole, Dustin and Jack (for whom he lanscaped personal dynamic paths through his adventurous backyard), as well as retired colleagues (to whom he mailed interesting newsletters), and the numerous students he inspired (many of whom he stayed in touch with) remember him fondly, as evidenced by the massive turnout at his memorial!
